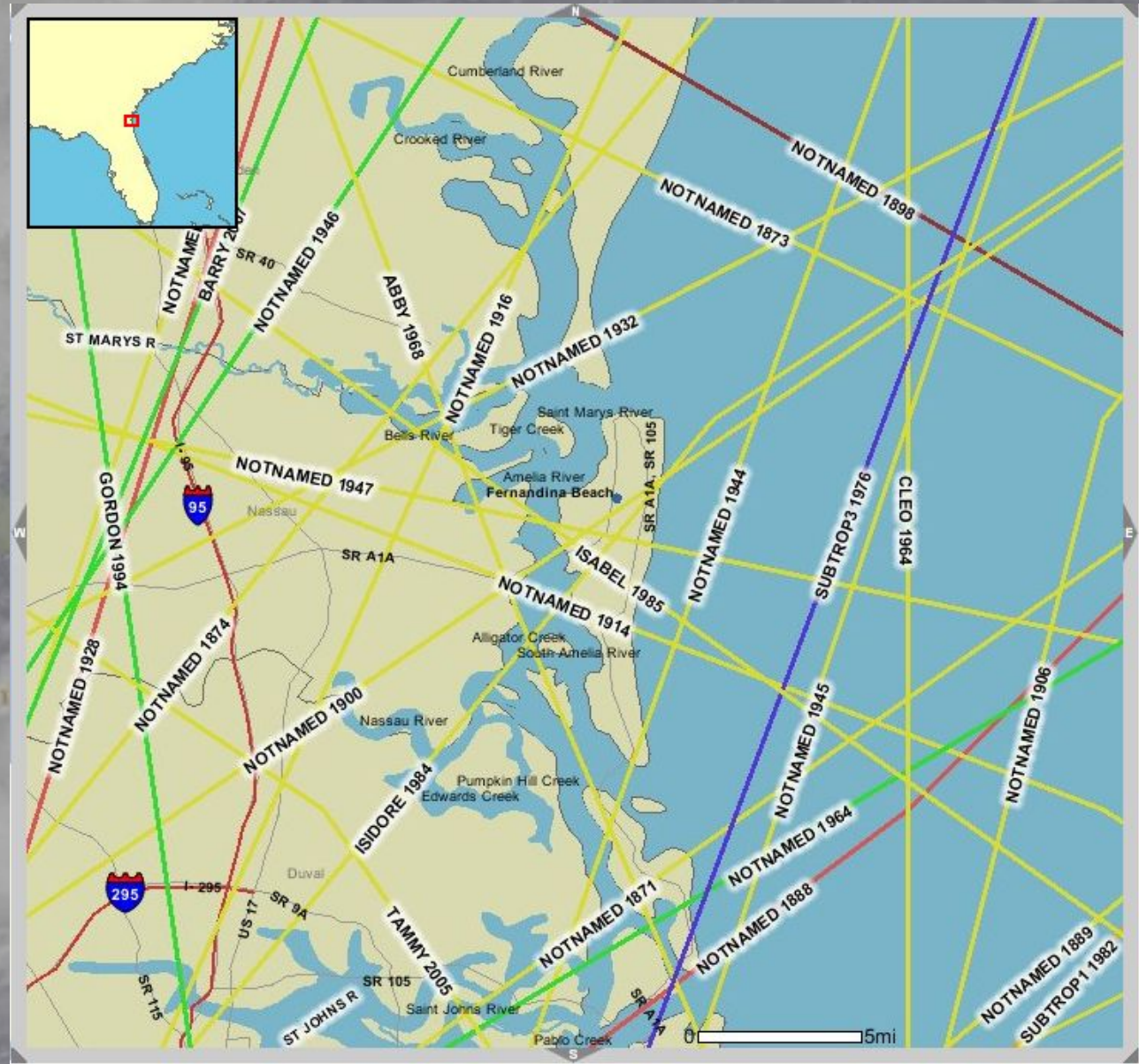

AMELIA ISLAND HURRICANE EVACUATION INFORMATION

As of June 1, 2006, all of Amelia Island is in a Category 1 Hurricane Evacuation Zone. This means a mandatory evacuation may be ordered when the island is threatened by a hurricane.

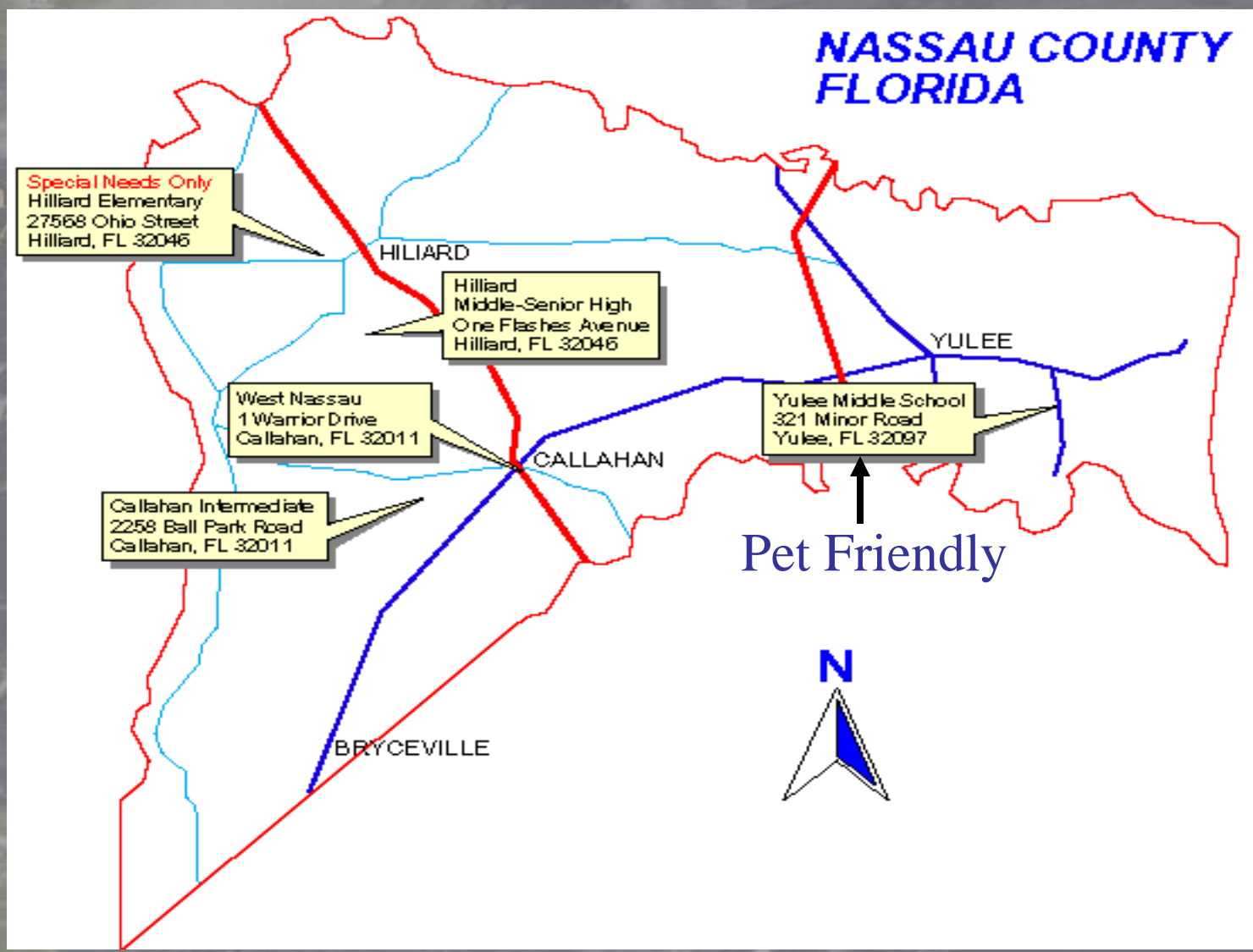
The Thomas J. Shave Bridge on the northern end of the island may be closed when sustained winds reach 40 miles per hour. The bridge on the south end of the island (near Long Point) connects to Heckscher Drive which is not considered a safe evacuation route. Therefore, it is possible to be asked to evacuate well in advance of a storm.

One-way egress, or 'contraflow' is always an option, but not an initial strategy. This is because it poses major challenges in re-routing subsequent intersections, ramps, etc. and our law enforcement resources are finite. However, if the situation was dire and a salvo effort was needed, yes, contraflow would be initiated.

Evacuation information usually is available 20 to 24 hours ahead of the storm's arrival. The estimated evacuation time for all of Amelia Island is 13 hours. The Nassau County Emergency Operations Center (EOC) will issue a pre-evacuation notice to the effect that "if the storm stays on track...." This pre-evacuation notice will be a "heads-up" for those who have special needs and/or simply want to leave early. AMELIA ISLAND PLANTATION HURRICANE PLAN

This plan specifies actions to be performed by Security and the "Company" in the case of an evacuation. Additional questions about storm effects and preparation can be obtained from the AIPCA web site.

AIP Security is not able to provide individual house checks to determine damage.

One-way egress, or 'contraflow' is always an option, but not an initial strategy. This is because it poses major challenges in re-routing subsequent intersections, ramps, etc. and our law enforcement resources are finite. However, if the situation was dire and a salvo effort was needed, yes, contraflow would be initiated.

RECOVERY ACTIONS (after the storm)

The Security Director and Asst Security Director, along with five representatives of Amelia Island Company will be among the first people allowed back on the island to assess damage. Information on damage and roadways will be passed on to the Nassau County Emergency Operations Center. Even if power is cut off, your Community Association will attempt to communicate through e-mail blasts for remote residents and other means locally.

YOUR PERSONAL HURRICANE PLAN

Each household needs to have its own Hurricane Plan well in advance of the Atlantic hurricane season (June 1 - November 30). AIP Security has assembled an excellent collection of materials for property owners available under the tabs labeled "Hurricane Preparedness" and "Security". This information includes a family preparedness guide, an emergency check list, a list of Nassau County Emergency Shelters, a list of motels in the Florida and Georgia area, and information on pet safety. We encourage you to use these materials as you make your own hurricane plan for your household.
